Today we celebrate the ministry of the whole people of God, and especially of those who worship and minister in this Diocese of Oxford.

United as the whole people of God, one body with many members, we come before God in prayer and praise to reaffirm our commitment to worship and to service. We come to the mother church of the diocese, a house of prayer for many centuries, and a sign of our unity with the communion of saints and the faithful of this diocese who have gone before us. As we worship God, we give thanks for the diversity of our callings and for the variety of our ministries, honouring all our differences and affirming that it is only together that we can fully be Christ's body.

Oils for the ministry of the church have been blessed on this day since the earliest Christian centuries. Blessed by the diocesan bishop, they symbolise the prayer of the whole diocese and the whole Church throughout the ages. As we take them to our parishes and communities, and as we use them in baptism, in confirmation, and in our ministry to the sick and the dying, we remember with thanksgiving that our ministry is Christ's and the people to whom we minister are God's precious children, made in his image and likeness.

Reflecting on this unity of ministry and mission, in this service we are all invited to recall the public promises we have made to serve Christ in our respective ministries among God's people. On the threshold of the holiest days of the Church's year, we dedicate ourselves afresh to our life of service, and prepare ourselves too to enter into the remembrance of Christ's passion and death, and the celebration of his resurrection.

1 Samuel 16: 1–13a

The Lord said to Samuel, ‘How long will you grieve over Saul? I have rejected him from being king over Israel. Fill your horn with oil and set out; I will send you to Jesse the Bethlehemite, for I have provided for myself a king among his sons.’ Samuel said, ‘How can I go? If Saul hears of it, he will kill me.’ And the Lord said, ‘Take a heifer with you, and say, “I have come to sacrifice to the Lord.” Invite Jesse to the sacrifice, and I will show you what you shall do; and you shall anoint for me the one whom I name to you.’ Samuel did what the Lord commanded, and came to Bethlehem. The elders of the city came to meet him trembling, and said, ‘Do you come peaceably?’ He said, ‘Peaceably; I have come to sacrifice to the Lord; sanctify yourselves and come with me to the sacrifice.’ And he sanctified Jesse and his sons and invited them to the sacrifice.

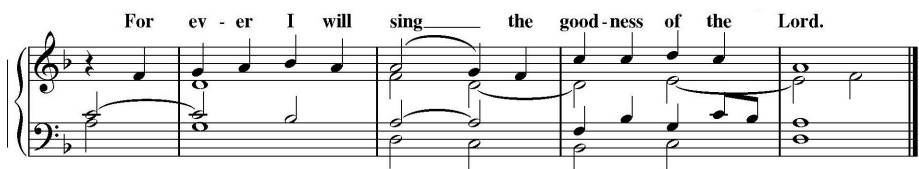

2 Corinthians 3: 17–4:12

Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit.

Therefore, since it is by God's mercy that we are engaged in this ministry, we do not lose heart. We have renounced the shameful things that one hides; we refuse to practise cunning or to falsify God's word; but by the open statement of the truth we commend ourselves to the conscience of everyone in the sight of God. And even if our gospel is veiled, it is veiled to those who are perishing. In their case the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers, to keep them from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God. For we do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus' sake. For it is the God who said, 'Let light shine out of darkness', who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

But we have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us.

We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be made visible in our bodies.

For while we live, we are always being given up to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus may be made visible in our mortal flesh. So death is at work in us, but life in you.

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Renewal of Ministerial Commitment

The renewal of ministerial commitment is led from the Shrine, to symbolise that ministry, derived from Christ, is entrusted to his Church with its saints, and accountable to him. Some of us will be able to see the Shrine in person, some on screens within the cathedral, and some on screen at home; but wherever we are, we are all one in Christ, engaged in the same ministry, and invited to join in with the appropriate renewal of our commitment to ministry.

Please remain standing if you are able. The Bishop of Oxford addresses all those present:

Bishop My brothers and sisters, at his Last Supper, our Lord Jesus Christ gave his disciples a new commandment, that they should love one another, and he prayed that they might be one. He gave them an everlasting sign of his own love, in the sacrament of bread and wine. He consecrated himself to his Father's service, to be the high priest of the new covenant. I invite you now to dedicate yourselves afresh to his service, as stewards of the mysteries of God, and ministers of his grace.

Christ has entrusted his ministry to the whole Church. In consequence of our baptism into Christ, we each have a ministry to exercise and a part to play in the body of Christ. Therefore I ask, will you serve the Lord with faith, humility and joy?

All **By the help of God, I will.**

Please sit. Licensed lay ministers remain standing and a Bishop addresses them:

When you were commissioned, you undertook to be faithful in prayer, and by word and example to minister to those for whom Christ died. Will you do all that is in your power to witness to God's love for his people?

LLMs By the help of God, I will.

LLMs sit.

Priests and deacons stand if they are able. A Bishop addresses them:

At your ordination as a deacon, you received the yoke of Christ, who came not to be served but to serve. Will you continue faithfully in this ministry, to build up God's people in his truth, and serve them in his name?

Deacons By the help of God, I will.

Deacons sit. A Bishop addresses the priests:

At your ordination to the priesthood, you took authority to watch over and care for God's people, to absolve and bless them in his name, to proclaim the gospel of salvation, and to minister the sacraments of his new covenant. Will you continue as faithful stewards of the mysteries of God, preaching the Gospel of Christ, and ministering his holy sacraments?

Priests By the help of God, I will.

Priests sit. John Sykes, Chair of the Diocesan Synod's House of Laity, addresses the bishops:

At your ordination as bishops, you received the gift of the Spirit, that you might lead the Church in mission, and send out ministers in Christ's name; that you might promote its unity, uphold its discipline, and guard its faith; and that you might teach and govern the people committed to your charge. Will you continue faithfully in this ministry, watching over Christ's own flock, and building them up in the unity of the Spirit and the bond of peace?

Bishops By the help of God, I will.

Please stand if you are able. John Sykes addresses all the ministers:

May the God of peace sanctify you wholly; and may your spirit and soul and body be kept sound and blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. He who calls you is faithful, and he will accomplish it.

All **Amen. Lord, have mercy.**

Three deacons bring the oils in procession to the sanctuary.

Bishop Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ
All **who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing.**

A deacon presents oil, saying:

The oil for anointing the sick and dying.

Bishop Blessed are you, sovereign God, gentle and merciful,
creator of heaven and earth.
Your Word brought light out of darkness,
and daily your Spirit renews the face of the earth.
Your anointed Son brought healing
to those in weakness and distress.
He broke the power of evil and set us free from sin and death
that we might praise your name for ever.
By the power of your Spirit may your blessing rest
on those who are anointed with this oil in your name;
may they be made whole in body, mind and spirit,
restored in your image, renewed in your love,
and serve you as sons and daughters in your kingdom.

All **Blessed be God for ever.**

A second deacon presents oil, saying:

The oil for signing with the cross at baptism.

the protector of all who believe in you.
Your anointed Son overcame the powers of evil
when he was lifted high upon the cross.
By the power of your Spirit may your blessing
rest on those who are anointed with this oil in your name;
as they come to the waters of baptism

and bring them to share in Christ's victory.

A third deacon presents oil, saying:

The oil of chrism.

Bishop Blessed are you, sovereign God and eternal Father,

to be the Christ, the Saviour and Servant of all.

as they share in the royal priesthood of the new covenant
and make known the kingdom of Jesus Christ our Lord,
to whom with you and the Holy Spirit
we lift our voices of thanks and praise:

Please collect oils for your ministry in the coming year from the Chapter House after the service. A stock is also kept at the cathedral, available on request.

If you have accepted the gift of a sapling, these are available to collect from the centre of the Cloister.

There is an opportunity to share coffee and pastries with colleagues over the road at St Aldate's. Please do join us there if you can.

The oils are made with fairly-traded olive oil from the Holy Land. Oil for anointing for the ministry of healing is scented with lavender, while oil of chrism is scented with balsam, frankincense, myrrh and cinnamon.

Thank you to all those who have been part of the service, both in preparation and in the cathedral today.

May God bless each of us in our several ministries and in our shared participation in his mission in this diocese.

The Oil for Anointing the Sick and the Dying

This oil is used in the Church's ministry of healing. Just as oil was used as a medical ointment (Luke 10:34), the Church anoints the sick and the dying to signify the work of the Holy Spirit in the healing of the sick. This follows the example of the apostles (Mark 6:13) and the teaching of James (5:14): 'Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord.'

The Oil for Signing with the Cross at Baptism

This oil is used for the Signing with the Cross, following the Decision, at the baptism of adults and infants. Alternatively, for adults, it may be used at the Signing with the Cross during the Call and Celebration of the Decision to be Baptised (*Common Worship: Christian Initiation*, p. 37). The practice of using oil in association with the rite of baptism has its origin in the natural use of olive oil in Mediterranean culture and draws on rich scriptural imagery. In relation to this pre-baptismal anointing, the Greco-Roman world's use of oil in connection with healing, washing and protecting the body is relevant, as is its use for preparing and softening an athlete's body for a contest.

The Oil of Chrism

This oil, to which perfume has been added to give it a sweet smell, is used for anointing after baptism. At the baptism of infants and adults, it may be poured over the crown of the head during the post-baptismal prayer: 'May God, who has received you by baptism into his Church, pour upon you the riches of his grace...' It may also be used at confirmation, ordination, and the consecration of altars and churches as well as the coronation of the monarch. When Peter the Apostle acknowledges Jesus as the 'Christ' (Mark 8:29), he was recognising him as the 'anointed one' of God ('*Christos*' in Greek, '*Messiah*' in Hebrew). Chrism has therefore been used in a variety of Christian traditions as a sign of participation in the community of the Anointed One and in the royal priesthood of the Church as well as the blessings brought by the Holy Spirit.
