When we say think outside the box, most autistic people look at me and say what box? I'm thinking big picture anyway.

I'm delighted to be here. I am indeed Ann Memmott. I'm autistic myself.

I've been working with Oxford Diocese for more than 30 years in one form or another,

01:01:41,559 --> 01:01:51,039 and of course in the current form as an external autism advisor. In other roles elsewhere,

01:01:51,039 --> 01:02:00,760 I advise for the national development team for inclusion, and also for the Anna Freud Centre.

01:02:00,760 --> 01:02:13,320 We're training NHS consultants on autism. In my spare time, I run a surveying firm, genuinely,

01:02:13,320 --> 01:02:19,480 and I'm also part of care reviews for autistic young people and those who are autistic young people

who also have learning disabilities who are also in you know, very high support settings.

and so many people think that if you have no ability to speak, that must mean

What does it mean for us in church as well? We know that autistic people are already in our church.

31

01:04:20,280 --> 01:04:29,039 They're already leading our church. I know a good number of really good, really, caring autistic vicars,

01:04:29,039 --> 01:04:38,960 and indeed some higher up, I should not say who. Autistic people are already the musicians in your church,

33

01:04:38,960 --> 01:04:50,159 already in the choir, already the bellringers, perhaps the organists, the youth workers, already prayer partners

34

01:04:50,159 --> 01:04:59,280 and others of every kind. And we know from all this research that has taken place that autism

35

01:04:59,280 --> 01:05:12,000 is almost nothing to do with young white boys with naughty behaviour. Or indeed with a skill with numbers.

I do have some skill with numbers. I know lots of autistic people who surely well do not.

37

01:05:18,480 --> 01:05:26,480 I'm probably a typical autistic person. This has quite alarmed a lot of people

38

01:05:26,480 --> 01:05:33,639 because they were really thinking it was young boys. But I'm a middle aged mum.

39

01:05:33,639 --> 01:05:42,599 We weren't looking for people like me. We also had some other very strange ideas

40

01:05:42,599 --> 01:05:48,840 which I've been delighted to see our research showing as true. We know that autistic people are generally

41

01:05:48,840 --> 01:05:53,960 less likely to be criminals, for example.

Honestly, some people had the idea that we were more likely



to do dangerously criminal things, so strange.

We know that autistic people are generally honest and loyal to those around us and creative and dedicated

44

01:06:11,719 --> 01:06:24,199 and passionate about justice and fairness. We know that autistic people are of all sorts of genders and sexualities.

01:06:24,199 --> 01:06:35,679 And there all sorts of ages and IQs, of all sorts of backgrounds and ethnicities.

01:06:35,679 --> 01:06:45,360 We know that autistic people sense the world differently and that our brains can become totally overloaded

01:06:45,360 --> 01:06:51,920 with sensory information from the world around us, including fluorescent lighting for example.

That's a big thing for many autistic people. Loud or sudden noise around us, perhaps some smells or textures.

01:07:05,480 --> 01:07:15,320 By my age, we manage those quite well, but it becomes exhausting, and what we see from autistic people

01:07:15,320 --> 01:07:26,280 is the distress of that exhaustion a lot of the time. We also know fantastic new research that autistic people

51

01:07:26,280 --> 01:07:35,880 have a genuinely different way of communicating socially and it works. They've done the studies on this.

52

01:07:35,880 --> 01:07:44,679 They've looked at us communicating with other autistic people. And gone, wow, this is even more effective

53

01:07:44,679 --> 01:07:50,159 than the communication of non-autistic people. Fantastic research.

01:08:14,840 --> 01:08:23,399 but a little bit like the deaf communities have their own cultures, their own ways of communicating.

01:08:23,399 --> 01:08:32,399 That's the same sort of thing that we have within ours. Thanks to those myths about autism

59

01:08:32,399 --> 01:08:42,399 and the lack of understanding, unfortunately, many of us have been denied just about every human right.

And sometimes it has been very hard to access church and to feel like we belong.

01:08:50,760 --> 01:09:02,000 Through this, I've been doing some lovely work, including with St Martin in the Fields in London

62

01:09:02,000 --> 01:09:14,800 and we run disability conferences by, for and with disabled people and neurodivergent people, which includes autism.

63

01:09:14,800 --> 01:09:24,680 There's been new thinking, new theology. Love, caring, fellowship, belonging.

64

01:09:24,680 --> 01:09:31,760 More and more people are coming out as autistic at those events. Why is that?

65

01:09:31,760 --> 01:09:38,399 You know, we've sat down and thought what is it and it is about belonging.

And belonging is not the same as access. A lot of our churches will say 'we are accessible. We have our ramp.'

That enables perhaps some people to get into a church, and they might still be ignored. They might still be ostracised.

01:10:04,239 --> 01:10:16,640 It's about belonging. It's about encountering, living, loving God. And I think that is what we are trying

We can make our churches safer places for someone to say, I'm autistic as well, it's me.

01:11:16,119 --> 01:11:21,840 but he was as autistic at the end as he was at the beginning. Wonderfully made.

thinking about being a parent of somebody who has the same if I use the word condition you know what I mean -

I know he won't mind me saying, he falls into a category of higher support needs because of a complex set of situations

How have you found the resilience to be completely yourself

in order to come up against the negativity?

Like my, my words are gone today. Where's my brain gone?

Have you found the resilience to combat those negative attitudes and to be yourself

01:14:48,399 --> 01:14:59,000 Such fantastic people I work with through some of the church work, but also the wider work in the community

01:14:59,000 --> 01:15:07,479 and in different organisations. So many of the researchers in particular are starting to realise that

01:15:07,479 --> 01:15:13,800 they can move away from the old myths, and they're starting to be more supportive and more affirming

That helps. Where you have anyone who's willing to put their hand up and go,

01:15:19,279 --> 01:15:26,760 'Ah, I may have misunderstood autism. Tell me more.' You know that gives you that sense of confidence.

01:15:26,760 --> 01:15:33,960 Sometimes I must admit I just lock my social media accounts and go, no, I've had enough.

01:15:33,960 --> 01:15:41,119 You know, there's only so much of yourself you can give out without thinking oh I really need that time away.

01:15:41,119 --> 01:15:53,840 But modelling myself is probably the most important gift I can do because if we force everyone to hide forever,

113

01:15:53,840 --> 01:16:01,760 what are we doing? It isn't a lot different to forcing everyone who's part of the LGBTQ communities to hide.

We need to be able to say to people it's OK. So yeah, I'm trying to do a bit of that.

01:16:08,760 --> 01:16:14,840 And that's about owning ourselves and then being confident to model who we are honestly.

01:16:14,840 --> 01:16:22,840 And there's been a question in the chat about information and research on autism as a culturally unique community,

01:16:22,840 --> 01:16:29,600 which you mentioned. I follow your Twitter thread and you post an awful lot of good research so

118

01:16:29,600 --> 01:16:37,880 can you point us to people who are doing good research on autistic people as a culturally unique community,

apart from you 'cause you're doing some good stuff as well.
