Questions and Replies

Question 1:	How do you think General Synod can promote engagement with the recommendations of the <i>From Lament to Action</i> report published in April this year?
Reply: 120 word limit applies	This a critical report that has been born out of the need to address long overdue issues, what I struggle with is when certain recommendations are put forward, the promised action doesn't happen, because of cost!
	So, I believe it is the job of the General Synod to ensure that in order for the necessary cultural change to happen those holding final decisions must be held to account, by ensuring we are moving forward, sticking to agreed deadlines and making sure decisions that are made are done so in the correct spirit of a truly Christian community. I work across rural north Bucks, due to poor resourcing and low finances I see the pressure that local parishes are under thus compromising their extraordinary work. It's important to remember that this is a church for the people first, so let's keep it local.
