Church at Home Mothering Sunday





Before the Service

Welcome to this service of Church at Home as we join together, from across the Diocese of Oxford, in worship this morning.

We are delighted that The Revd Charlotte Bannister-Parker is presiding for us and that Bishop Olivia Graham will be giving our reflection this morning. We are also especially grateful to all those from around the Diocese who have given of their time and talents to contribute to this service

Today is the fourth Sunday of Lent on which falls 'Mothering Sunday'. This Sunday marks a slight lightening of the solemnity of the Lenten season (you will notice the president wearing rose coloured vestments rather than the usual purple) as we look forward, with growing anticipation, to Easter.

Traditionally on this day people would visit their 'Mother Church' and servants were given the day off to be at home with family; sometimes bringing a bunch of flowers home to give to their mothers too.

In today's Gospel we hear Jesus commend his disciple John and his Mother Mary into one another's care as he hangs on the cross and, elsewhere in the gospels, Jesus even describes himself as being like a 'mother hen' longing to gather Jerusalem under her wing.

Jesus' actions here speak powerfully into the tenderness, care and love we are all called to offer to one another as adopted children in God's family. On a day which holds mixed feelings for many, Jesus speaks to all of us, whatever our gender, age, relationship or family situation, and entrusts us into the care of one another, as he entrusted John and Mary into each other's care from the cross.

As we worship this morning, we give thanks for the 'Mother Church' of this Diocese, Christ Church Cathedral (from which the service comes), and we also remember and give thanks for all the churches and the people who have shown the motherly love of God to us.

Near the cross of Jesus stood his mother...
when Jesus saw his mother there, and the disciple
whom he loved standing nearby, he said to her,
"Woman, here is your son,"
and to the disciple, "Here is your mother."
(John 19.25-27)

If it is safe to do so, you may like to have a tea light or candle ready at home to light when the president lights the large candle at the beginning of the service.

In due time Hannah conceived and hore a son. She named him Samuel, for she said, 'I have asked him of the Lord,' The man Elkanah and all his household went. up to offer to the Lord the yearly sacrifice, and to pay his yow. But Hannah did not go up, for she said to her husband, 'As soon as the child is weaned, I will bring him, that he may appear in the presence of the Lord, and remain there for ever: I will offer him as a nazirite for all time.' Her husband Elkanah said to her, 'Do what seems best to you, wait until you have weaned him: only—may the Lord establish his word.' So the woman remained and nursed her son, until she weaned him.
