The heart of worship

Welcome to Church at Home for the third Sunday in Lent. We are thrilled to have as our president the Revd Janet Binns, rector of St Nicholas', Hedsor, and St Mark's, Bourne End, with the Rt Revd Dr Alan Wilson, the Bishop of Buckingham, giving our reflection. Lent is the season in which we are called - and have even been compelled for a spell - to leave bricks and mortar behind and join that great movement of the God of hope, who for our sake came to be with us, to live among us. We journey with him to the unexpected culmination of his time with us, a deep darkness, which dawns to reveal our salvation.

Lent evolved historically as the principal season for preparing new Christians for baptism and those who had been excluded from the Church's fellowship for reconciliation. As the whole Christian community was invited to join both groups in the process of study and contemplation, we continue to invite you along with us on this journey of self-examination and discovery in this season; Come and See.

This Sunday, we turn our attention back to the heart of worship. We are beckoned away from the necessary structures, processes and traditions that protect the sacred within to gaze at the perfection, purity and peace that is Christ, the new temple and the reason for our worship.

In our gospel reading, we find Jesus 'cleansing' the old temple as we recall what happened when Christ entered his Father's house only to find commerce and religious economy eclipsing God's original intention for the building.

In fellowship now with one another, Christ, the new temple, receives each one of us. As the words of the old hymn go, 'just as I am without one plea... I come.' So come on in.

Reader A reading from the first letter to the Corinthians.

For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written,

'I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart.' Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe.

For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling-block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem.
