
Church at Home

Before the Service

A very warm welcome to Church at Home this Second Sunday before Advent.

We are delighted that our President is the Revd Hugh Ellis, Team Rector in the High Wycombe Team Ministry in Buckinghamshire, and our address is given by the Revd Liz Jackson, Associate Archdeacon of Berkshire. Other contributions to our worship originate from across the Areas of our Diocese. Many thanks to all who have shared their time, gifts and skills to lead us in worship.

Talking of gifts and skills, the theme of our service this week is **Encouraging Talents**. In the ancient world, a 'talent' was a unit of currency. Our Gospel reading is Jesus' Parable of the Talents – the story of a man who entrusts a quantity of talents to his slaves, then expects them to have multiplied upon his return. Christians have long recognised a play on words in the word 'talent' – assuming this parable is about individual gifts and abilities and how we must use them, or else... Yet as our address reminds us, it is critically important that we have the right understanding of how God is *not* like the master in the parable; and why God calls us to use our gifts in ways that differ from the unjust economic systems of Jesus' age – and of our own. The God revealed in Jesus calls us to grow our gifts and talents out of love not threat, in freedom not fear.

Since well before the challenges and changes of 2020, the Diocese of Oxford has been seeking to encourage everyone of us disciples to discover and develop our talents – in order to grow in faith and love, for the sake of God's world. With the coming of the pandemic, many church communities have responded in extraordinary ways, recognising new talents among themselves in the process. Some have realised new ways of serving neighbours; others have set up new systems for worship; still others have shared artistic and creative talents in compassionate, courageous, and contemplative ways. Yet, sometimes – even in COVID-19 times – we don't always know which gifts we have, or how they could be a part of our healthy growth as disciples. Based on the Church of England's *Everyday Faith* initiative, the Diocese has tools designed to enable you to identify where your gifts are strongest, and then explore where you may be being called to share them. One such tool is a *Personal Discipleship Plan*. At the end of our service, the Revd Tina Molyneux, Discipleship Enabler in the Diocese of Oxford, talks to Paul Armitage from Wokingham about the difference a Personal Discipleship Plan has made to his faith walk. Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. When they say, 'There is peace and security', then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labour pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness. So then, let us not fall asleep as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober; for those who sleep sleep at night, and those who are drunk get drunk at night. But since we belong to the day, let us be sober, and put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation. For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live with him. Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.

Matthew 25: 14-30

Reader Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

All Glory to you, O Lord.

[Jesus said:] 'For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them; to one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away. The one who had received the five talents went off at once and traded with them, and made five more talents. In the same way, the one who had the two talents made two more talents. But the one who had received the one talent went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. After a long time the master of those slaves came and settled accounts with them. Then the one who had received the five talents came forward, bringing five more talents, saying, "Master, you handed over to me five talents; see, I have made five more talents." His master said to him, "Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master." And the one with the two talents also came forward, saying, "Master, you handed over to me two talents; see, I have made two more talents." His master said to him, "Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master." Then the one who had received the one talent also came forward, saying, "Master, I knew that you were a harsh man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not scatter seed; so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours." But his master replied, "You wicked and lazy slave! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter? Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return I

would have received what was my own with interest. So take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents. For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.".
