
Church at Home The Third Sunday after Trinity





Before the Service

A very warm welcome to our Church at Home service for the Third Sunday after Trinity. We are delighted that Revd Shemil Mathew, Chaplain to Oxford Brookes University, presides at this morning's service from his home and the address is given by the Rt Revd Colin Fletcher, Bishop of Dorchester.

We open today's service with a special prayer from the Rt Revd Olivia Graham, Bishop of Reading, to honour and mourn those who lost their lives in the terrorist attack in Reading last Saturday night. May we respond with grace and compassion to this terrible act, and may our elected officials and civil servants respond with courage and wisdom.

We continue to remember those who are still suffering during the ongoing coronavirus pandemic. We pray that the number of people affected by this disease continues to fall and that a vaccine is found soon. We also hold in our hearts the countries around the world where numbers are still increasing and hope that every patient receives the care they need.

This service would not have been possible without the support of the lead liturgist, Revd Canon Toby Wright, Team Rector of the Benefice of Witney, nor without contributions of music, scripture and prayers by pastors and parishioners from Witney, Hanborough and Freeland, Reading, Banbury, the Parish of the Claydons, Twyford, Winslow, Oxford Brookes University, Parish Nursing Ministries UK, Bourne End and Dorchester.

This morning we are so grateful that our churches across the Diocese begin to be reopened and give thanks that we are able to welcome congregations back into the physical space of church, even though social distancing and other measures remain in place. To express our gratitude, and remembering how blessed we are to have basic needs met, we open today's service with a grace composed, in his youth, by the Very Revd J. Paul Burbridge, the father of Revd Sarah Bourne from St Mary's, Banbury. Together, as brothers and sisters in Christ, let us bless the Lord in worship and praise.

The Eucharistic Prayer

President	The Lord be with you
All	and also with you.
President	Lift up your hearts.
All	We lift them to the Lord.
President	Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

	You are worthy of our thanks and praise, Lord God of truth, for by the breath of your mouth you have spoken your word, and all things have come into being.
	You fashioned us in your image and placed us in the garden of your delight. Though we chose the path of rebellion you would not abandon your own. Again and again you drew us into your covenant of grace. You gave your people the law and taught us by your prophets to look for your reign of justice, mercy and peace.
	As we watch for the signs of your kingdom on earth, we echo the song of angels in heaven, evermore praising you and singing:

Holy, Holy, Holy Lord. God of power and might. Heaven and earth are full of your glory, hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Gracious Lord God, you are the most holy one, enthroned in splendour and light, yet in the coming of your Son Jesus Christ you reveal the power of your love made perfect in our human weakness.

Embracing our humanity, Jesus showed us the way of salvation; loving us to the end, he gave himself to death for us; dying for his own, he set us free from the bonds of sin, that we might rise and reign with him in glory.

On the night he gave up himself for us all he took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying:

Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Therefore we proclaim the death that he suffered on the cross, we celebrate his resurrection, his bursting from the tomb, we rejoice that he reigns at your right hand on high and we long for his coming in glory.

As we recall the one, perfect sacrifice of our redemption, Father, by your Holy Spirit let these gifts of your creation be to us $mathbb{P}$ the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ; form us into the likeness of Christ and make us a perfect offering in your sight.

Look with favour on your people and in your mercy hear the cry of our hearts...

Bless the earth, heal the sick, let the oppressed go free and fill your Church with power from on high.

Gather your people from the ends of the earth to feast with Mary, the Mother of Jesus, Frideswide, Birinus and all the saints at the table in your kingdom, where the new creation is brought to perfection in Jesus Christ our Lord; by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.

Giving of Communion

We meditate on the words of Jesus, 'I am the bread of life', as recorded in John 6:22-71, noting St Augustine's comment on this passage: 'Believe, and you have eaten already.'

We are invited to make a spiritual communion with God, who comes to meet us wherever we are. There are no special words or prayers for this. All the Church has ever thought necessary is a true desire to receive Christ, a lively faith in Christ, and a genuine love for Christ and his people.

The anthem for reflection is the Taizé Community's 'Laudemus Deum'. Translation: Let us praise God, who has created and redeemed us, and will save us by his mercy alone (St Francis of Assisi).
