

Ordination of Deacons

1 July 2023

A very warm welcome to Christ Church and to this very special service, as those whom God has called to serve him as deacons in this diocese are ordained. Later, the Bishop will explain that deacons are called to 'proclaim the gospel in word and deed, as agents of God's purposes of love': a particular fulfilment of the calling given to all God's people. As we celebrate those who become deacons today, please pray for them; for their families and supporters, for their parishes and those they serve; but also for all God's people as we seek to be God's light and love in the world.

If you normally receive Communion in your own church, and if you have been baptised, you are welcome to receive today. Otherwise, you are warmly invited to receive a blessing. Please follow the stewards' instructions. If you need a gluten-free wafer, please come to the dedicated station in front of the High Altar at the east end of the Cathedral.

Children are very welcome at Cathedral services, and you are encouraged to stay throughout the service, however much noise they make; but you are also welcome to take them into the Cloister to run around, or the Chapter House just off the Cloister, where there is a large screen relaying the service. You should have received some children's resources as you arrived; if you need those, or anything else, please ask a steward.

A large print version of this service booklet is available. There is a hearing loop, which is most effective in the centre of the Cathedral away from the pillars. Please feel free to sit at any point during the service.

This is a public occasion. Please be aware that the service is livestreamed and photographed. If you do not wish to be filmed, please ask a steward. No other photography or filming is permitted during the service. The Greeting

Bishop Blessed be God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

All Blessed be his kingdom, now and for ever. Amen.

The Congregation sits. The Bishop introduces the service.

Bishop

God calls his people to follow Christ, and forms us into a royal priesthood, a holy nation, to declare the wonderful deeds of him who has called us out of darkness into his marvellous light.

The Church is the Body of Christ, the people of God and the dwelling-place of the Holy Spirit. In baptism the whole Church is summoned to witness to God's love and to work for the coming of his kingdom.

To serve this royal priesthood, God has given a variety of ministries. Deacons are ordained so that the people of God may be better equipped to make Christ known. Theirs is a life of visible self-giving. Christ is the pattern of their calling and their commission; as he washed the feet of his disciples, so they must wash the feet of others.

Prayers of Penitence

Deacon God calls all people to obedience and faith.

As we prepare to celebrate his love in Word and Sacrament, let us remember our failings, confess our sins, and pray for strength to amend our lives.

We remain seated or kneel.

All Almighty God, our heavenly Father,

we have sinned against you
and against our neighbour
in thought and word and deed,
through negligence, through weakness,
through our own deliberate fault.
We are truly sorry and repent of all our sins.
For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, who died for us,
forgive us all that is past

and grant that we may serve you in newness of life

to the glory of your name.

Bishop Almighty God,

who forgives all who truly repent,

have mercy upon you,

pardon and delivery you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness,

and keep you in life eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The Archdeacon presents those to be ordained, saying:

Bishop Steven, I present these persons to be ordained to the office of deacon in the Church of God.

The Archdeacon then reads the name of each person, with the place where they are to serve. Each ordinand stands as their name is read.

When the ordinands have been presented, the Bishop asks these questions of the Director of Ordinands and those involved with the ordinands' training, who all stand to respond.

Bishop Have those whose duty it is to know these ordinands and examine them found them to be of godly life and sound

learning?

DDOs They have.

Bishop Do they believe them to be duly called to serve God in this

ministry?

DDOs They do.

The Bishop turns to the ordinands and says:

Bishop Do you believe that God is calling you to this ministry?

Ordinands I do so believe.

Bishop I invite the Registrar to confirm that the ordinands have

taken the necessary oaths and made the Declaration of

Assent.

Registrar They have duly taken the oath of allegiance to the

Sovereign and the oath of canonical obedience to the Bishop. They have affirmed and declared their belief in 'the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness'.

Old Testament Reading 1 Samuel 3.1–10 (NRSV) read by a Licensed Lay Minister

Reader A reading from the Book of Samuel.

Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the Lord under Eli. The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread.

At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was. Then the Lord called, 'Samuel! Samuel!'a and he said, 'Here I am!' and ran to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' But he said, 'I did not call; lie down again.' So he went and lay down. The Lord called again, 'Samuel!' Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' But he said, 'I did not call, my son; lie down again.' New Testament Reading Romans 12.1–13 (NRSV)

Reader A reading from the Letter to the Romans.

I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect.

For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of yourself more highly than you ought to think, but to think with sober judgement, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned. For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us: prophecy, in proportion to faith; ministry, in ministering; the teacher, in teaching; the exhorter, in exhortation; the giver, in generosity; the leader, in diligence; the compassionate, in cheerfulness.

Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honour. Do not lag in zeal, be ardent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers.

Deacon Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

The Congregation stands. The ordinands turn and face the people.

Bishop Brothers and sisters, you have heard how great is the charge

that these ordinands are ready to undertake, and you have

heard their declarations.

Is it now your will that they should be ordained?

All It is.

Bishop Will you continually pray for them?

All We will.

Bishop Will you uphold and encourage them in their ministry?

All We will.

The ordinands turn back to face the Bishop, who continues addressing them.

In the name of our Lord, we bid you remember the greatness of the trust in which you are now to share: the ministry of Christ himself, who for our sake took the form of a servant.

Remember always with thanksgiving that the people among whom you will minister are made in God's image and likeness. In serving them you are serving Christ himself, before whom you will be called to account.

You cannot bear the weight of this calling in your own strength, but only by the grace and power of God. Pray therefore that your heart may daily be enlarged and your understanding of the Scriptures enlightened.

Pray earnestly for the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The Congregation and the ordinands kneel. Silence is kept.

The Ordination Prayer

The Bishop stands to pray, while others remain kneeling.

Bishop We praise and glorify you, almighty Father, because in your infinite love you have formed throughout the world a holy people for your own possession, a royal priesthood,

a universal Church.

We praise and glorify you because you sent your only Son Jesus Christ to take the form of a slave; he humbled himself for our sake, and in obedience accepted death, even death on a cross.

We praise and glorify you because in every age you send your Spirit to fill those whom you have chosen, to equip your holy people for the work of ministry, for the building up of the body of Christ.

And now we give you thanks that you have called these your servants whom we ordain in your name, to share as deacons in the ministry of the gospel of Christ, who came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.

Therefore, Father, through Christ our Lord we pray:

Here the Bishop lays his hands on the head of each ordinand, saying:

Bishop Send down the Holy Spirit on your servant N

for the office and work of a deacon in your Church.

When the Bishop has laid hands on all the ordinands, the prayer continues:

Bishop Through your Spirit, heavenly Father,

give these your servants

grace and power to fulfil their ministry.

Make them faithful to serve

and constant in advancing your gospel in the world.

May they follow the example of Jesus Christ your Son,

who washed the feet of his disciples,

and set the needs of others before his own.

May their life be disciplined and holy,

their words declare your love

and their actions reveal your glory,

that your people may walk with them in the way of truth and be made ready for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ;

to whom, with you and your Holy Spirit,

belong glory and honour, worship and praise,

now and for ever.

The Giving of the New Testament

The Congregation sits, and the newly ordained deacons stand.

The Bishop gives the New Testament to each of them, saying:

Bishop Receive this book,

as a sign of the authority given you this day

to speak God's word to his people.

Build them up in his truth

and serve them in his name.

On behalf of the clergy of the Diocese, a member of the Cathedral Chapter welcomes the newly ordained deacons:

Canon We preach not ourselves but Christ Jesus as Lord

and ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake.

All We welcome you as fellow servants in the gospel:

may Christ dwell in your hearts through faith, that you may be rooted and grounded in love.

The training incumbents of the newly ordained deacons help them to vest in a stole or scarf, symbol of their new ministry.

The Peace

The Congregation stands.

Bishop We are all one in Christ Jesus.

All We belong to him through faith,

heirs of the promise of the Spirit of peace.

Bishop The peace of the Lord be always with you

All and also with you.

Deacon Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

Breaking of the Bread

If you normally receive Communion in your own church, or if you have been confirmed, you are most welcome to receive here — please follow the directions of the stewards to the appropriate station. If you would rather receive a blessing, you are very warmly invited to come forward in the same way; please bring this order of service with you so that the ministers know that you want a blessing.

If you need a gluten-free wafer, please ask the stewards to direct you to the High Altar at the front of the Cathedral.

If you wish Communion to be brought to you, please speak to a steward.

As the distribution of Communion begins, the Choir sings the Agnus Dei.

The Declaration of Assent

The Declaration of Assent is made by deacons, priests and bishops of the Church of England when they are ordained and on each occasion when they take up a new appointment (Canon C 15). Today's candidates swore their oaths and made their declarations in the Cloister with the presiding bishop and registrar before the service.

When the new deacons are welcomed into their parishes, these declarations are often read out at a principal service.

Preface

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church, worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-Nine Articles of Religion, The Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make, will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making Him known to those in your care?

Declaration of Assent

I, A B, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I will use only the forms of service which are authorised or allowed by Canon.
