

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

LETTER FROM BISHOP BRIAN TO THE FAITHFUL IN THE DIOCESE

Subject: The Church's Role in Pursuing Human Rights: Honouring Desmond Tutu's Legacy

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Greetings to you all in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. As we enter Human Rights Month, I wanted to take this opportunity to reflect on the crucial role of the Church in pursuing human rights and draw inspiration from the remarkable legacy of the late Archbishop Emeritus Desmond Tutu.



LENTEN REFLECTIONS

Lent is a time devoted to fasting, abstinence, and penitence in commemoration of Christ's fasting in the wilderness. The purpose of Lent is the preparation of the believer for Easter through prayer, mortifying the flesh, repentance of sins, almsgiving, simple living, and self-denial.

So as we reduce things such as careless speech, we can use that time to draw closer to God. One of the ways in which we can grow closer to God is by journaling and reflecting on his word and our faith.

Mrs Kim Maritz has a guideline for those who don't know where and how to start. Mrs Maritz believes that devotional journaling is a personal and evolving practice and can be adjusted to suit one's preferences. She encourages believers to let journaling be a source of spiritual nourishment and growth in your faith.

For a spiritually enriching and reflective practice, we care called on to keep a devotional journal using the 2024 Diocesan theme;

"Rooted in Faith, Radiating Christ's Love" Ephesians 3:17

Devotional Journaling Guidelines

1. Select a Journal:

Choose a journal that resonates with you. It could be a dedicated notebook, a digital journaling app, or even a section in your existing journal.

2. Set the Atmosphere:

Create a peaceful environment for your devotional time. Find a quiet space, light a candle, or play soft instrumental music to set the mood.

3. Start with Prayer:

Begin your devotional time with a prayer. Ask for guidance, clarity, and an open heart to receive insights during your reflection.

- Do you feel you have grown spiritually during this Lenten Period?
- What challenges have you experienced during your Lenten journey?
- What joys can you share about your Lenten growth?

Community Clean Up Day

A community cleanup brings volunteers together to clean, repair, and improve public spaces and areas that have been neglected, vandalized, or misused. Pick up a piece of plastic rubbish and talk to God about how you feel about it. A lament is a prayer expressing sorrow, pain or confusion. The Bible contains many laments (see, for example: Psalms 3, 10 and 94; the book of Lamentations; Matthew 23:37–39; Matthew 27:46). So, feel free to lament the state of our world, and all we have done to it. If it helps, take some time to write down your prayers and reflections.

WEEK TWO



Mary, Undoer of Knots

VISIO DIVINA: MARY, UNDOER OF KNOTS

Freedom is the ultimate pursuit of Human Rights. There are various factors that hinder our freedom, many tangled knots that hold us back from experiencing spiritual growth, personal transformation and a deeper connection to our faith and our God.

In the Lenten Course designed by Bishop Brian with the help of Mrs Kim Maritz, PA to the Bishop, we are introduced to Visio Divina, or "Divine Seeing", a contemplative practice involving visual images. For those of a Protestant perspective, using the painting of 'Mary, Undoer of Knots' can be a meaningful way to engage in this practice. Visio Divina can be an entry way to pursue the freedom Jesus long obtained for us. As we hand over our tangled knots to Mary, may we feel liberated to live a life that glorifies God, a life in which we love one another as we love ourselves.

Gracious God.

As I come before You in prayer, I seek Your guidance in the spirit of humility and trust. Like Mary, who embraced Your divine plan with unwavering faith, I, too, desire clarity and direction in my life.

Untangle the knots of confusion and uncertainty that cloud my path. Grant me the wisdom to discern Your will and the courage to follow where You lead. Help me surrender my concerns and fears, trusting that Your grace can unravel even the most complex situations.

May the example of Mary's obedience inspire me to align my will with Yours and to walk in the light of Your truth. In seeking guidance, I place my trust in Your divine wisdom and providence.

VISIO DIVINA - GUIDE

1. Preparation:

Find a quiet space where you won't be disturbed. Sit comfortably, take a few deep breaths, and

centre yourself. Invite the Holy Spirit into your time of meditation.

2. Observation (Lectio):

Begin by carefully observing the painting (see the painting on the next page). Notice the details,

colours, and expressions. Consider the overall composition and the emotions it evokes. Reflect on

the symbolism present in the image.

3. Meditation (Meditatio):

Allow your mind to dwell on the elements of the painting. Consider the knots in the tapestry as

symbolic of life's complexities. How might these knots resonate with your own experiences? Ponder

the figure of Mary—her posture, gaze, and the sense of peace she exudes.

4. Prayer (Oratio):

Engage in a conversation with God. Share your thoughts and feelings inspired by the painting. Offer

any knots or challenges in your life to God, seeking His guidance and intervention. Express gratitude

for the assurance of His presence in unravelling life's complexities.

5. Contemplation (Contemplatio):

Sit in stillness, allowing God to speak to you through the visual elements. Let the painting become a window to divine insights and guidance. Embrace any emotions that arise and be open to the Spirit's movement.

6. Action (Actio):

Consider how the insights gained from this visio divina practice can inform your actions. Are there specific steps you feel led to take? How might the experience influence your perspective on facing life's challenges?

Remember, this practice is a personal journey, and each person may experience it uniquely. It's a way to engage with the visual representation of Mary, Undoer of Knots, from the perspective of your own spiritual tradition.



IO MARCH - MOTHERING SUNDAY

Mothering Sunday is a day honouring mother churches, the church where one is baptised and becomes "a child of the church". This typically involves spoiling mothers with gifts and attention and celebrating the women who have nurtured us throughout our lives. This day has been celebrated since the Middle Ages but in later times, it became a day when domestic servants were given a day off to visit their mother church, usually with their own mothers and other family members.

So if you worked in Kimberly but your mother church was in Mahikeng, your boss would give you time off to go back to your mother church for celebrations.

The Mothering Sunday celebrations are similar to Mother's Day, but where Mother's Day is originally an American Holiday, Mothering Sunday is originally from the United Kingdom. Along with the UK, Ireland and some Commonwealth countries celebrate this day on the fourth Sunday of Lent.

What remains at the core of both these celebrations is that mothers are important and the inside of their bellies might truly be our first church. God delicately formed us there, setting us apart and destining us for great work.

2I MARCH: HUMAN RIGHTS DAY CHILDREN'S RIGHTS ARE HUMAN RIGHTS

Below is an extract of a speech given by Graça Machel at the 11th Annual Desmond Tutu International Peace Lecture.

Arch has himself said, and I quote, "Children are a wonderful gift. They have an extraordinary capacity to see into the heart of things and to expose sham and humbug for what they are." Unquote. And he is absolutely right. Our precious children are under siege in South Africa and are exposing our glaring failures to them. It is the fate of young women in South Africa and around the globe that I would like to give voice and flesh to today.

How do we ensure those who are custodians of safety and security actually treasure and cherish those they are meant to protect and adore?

The value of a child's life, their protection and well-being need to be our paramount concern as a society. Peace and justice has to start and reside in the hearts of each one of us, in the hearts of our families and in the hearts of our communities.

We are a society at war with itself. We adults are wounded. We are unhealed individuals who come together to form families and communities which are then fractured and broken as well. And we are passing on our trauma to our next generation.

Violence is the breastmilk we are feeding our young, our children are growing up experiencing hostility, exploitation and abuse on a daily basis. If not directly, first-hand, they are exposed to this trauma second-hand in their social media feeds and in the news headlines as well. And so it should come as no surprise that having being socialised in a culture of violence, a natural tendency will be to operate in the world from a place of aggression, physical combativeness and hopelessness.

When I look into the eyes of Arch, I see so much love and compassion and I ask, why don't we draw from his life a source of wisdom, moral authority and the deep empathy needed to change this trajectory?

Don't we need a therapy of the soul to undertake the monumental task of transformation and untangle ourselves from the wicked webs of our trauma and toxic patriarchy?

We as adults have to change. We have constitutions, courts, progressive policies and legislation in place to protect women and children, but our failure is one of a human nature. We have to change our mindsets, our behaviours, our value system. We must reinvent our relationships and reengineer the way we relate in our families, in our schools, in our workplaces, with the spirit of ubuntu that Arch taught us and exudes with every fibre of his being.






ARCHBISHOP EMERITUS DESMOND TUTU ON FORGIVENESS

Children are a wonderful gift. They have an extraordinary capacity to see into the heart of things and to expose sham and humbug for what they are.


On Shoulders







THE 14 STATIONS OF THE CROSS

There are a few characteristics that will have you know that you are inside an Anglican Church. One being, it doesn't matter which way you turn, you're bound to land your eyes on a cross, or on a picture of Jesus, in deep pain, carrying a cross, making his way to buy us eternal freedom.

As we enter into the Holy Week, the significance of the cross becomes most pertinent. Through the hymns and choruses we sing of its power and look forward to rising again with Christ.

Here are the 14 Stations of the Cross, which will give you context for the beautiful art that hangs on the church walls. These stations also play a big role in our reverence for the cross and our salvation.

- 1. Jesus is condemned to death.
- 2. Jesus is made to bear his cross.
- 3. Jesus falls the first time.
- 4. Jesus meets his mother.
- 5. Simon of Cyrene is made to bear the cross.
- 6. Veronica wipes Jesus' face.
- 7. Jesus falls the second time.
- 8. The women of <u>Jerusalem</u> weep over Jesus.
- 9. Jesus falls the third time.
- 10. Jesus is stripped of his garments.
- 11. Jesus is nailed to the cross.
- 12. Jesus dies on the cross.
- 13. Jesus is taken down from the cross.
- 14. Jesus is placed in the sepulchre.

23 - 29 MARCH - NATIONAL WATER WEEK

The Diocese of Kimberley and Kuruman reaches across two provinces, the Northern Cape and the North West Provinces, the vastness of the provinces and diversity of its people is remarkable. Yet when we gather, we all understand the water crisis that affects our daily lives. The Northern Cape Province is the driest province in South Africa, the scarcity of water resources is a defining feature of this arid environment. Our behaviour towards water consumption needs to change, only then will it contribute towards improving the water situation.

Intercessory Prayers: You will need a glass of clean water, a glass of salted water, a bottle of coke and an empty glass are used.

Leader: (Holding the glass of clean water) Lord let this glass of clean water reminds us of the available sources of fresh drinking water. Help us to protect this gift. May our lives be so balanced that greed makes way for need and our wastefulness makes way for a commitment to preserve and share.

All: Fountain of life, wash us clean from greed and sin.

Leader: (Holding the glass of salted water) Let this glass of salted water remind us of the tears of those whose lives have been threatened by the scarcity of water, compounded by the stigma and discrimination they face. Let those who contribute to exploitative systems and mechanisms, shed tears of repentance and learn to lead simple lives so that others can simply live. **All:** Creator of new life, transform us so that we have welling within us, springs of eternal life.

Leader: (Holding a bottle of coke) God of justice, we pray for all those who are resisting those who plunder and pillage our natural resources and threaten the livelihoods of our communities. We remember all those engaged in preservation and sharing of water, your gift of life, guide them and sustain them in their endeavours.

All: God of justice strengthen these "earthkeepers"

Leader: (Holding the empty glass) Lord we pray for all the communities who are involved in the issue of water justice. Sensitise us, to walk with all the people who lack the water of life. Help us to empty ourselves of all the prejudices and fill us with a vision of solidarity and fellowship so that we can liaise and work with other likeminded people in conserving the gift water. **All:** God of justice, give us your vision.

Leader: Lord, we pray for the universal church and its mission and vision. Transform our lifestyles so that, not only in words but in deeds we may be channels of your justice. Let your churches be role models within our communities in conserving water and preserving life in all its fullness. Make your churches work together so that justice will prevail, and water will be available for all in our generation and beyond.

All: God of resurrection, make us channels of your living water.

Leader: We bring these prayers to you in the name of Christ, our Saviour, **All:** Amen.

Let us pray:


